Reuse of Treated Wastewater for Agriculture in Southern Gaza Strip

- Project Period: 3 Years 2017-2020
- Target Population:
- Partners: PEF, PARC
- Steer: PWA, CMWU, MoH, MoA



- Expected Outputs
- Irrigating 200 Dunums through reuse of treated WW
- Institutionalising WW reuse through legal framework & governance model...
- 3. Establishing a monitoring & verification system for treatment and reuse of wastewater
- Establishing a replicable model for TWW reuse



Encouraging technology innovations

- SWIM in Gaza

Reuse of Treated Wastewater for Agriculture in Southern Gaza Strip

Challenges

- Resistance from few of the selected community due to unfounded fear regarding the WW reservoir
- Security situation: Carrier line passes along the border

- Ways Ahead
- Mitigation measures adopted, project site shifted to Al Mawasi
- Level of acceptance measured
- RNA carried out- no need for reservoir, shorter carrier line.
- Farmers face water scarcity and see the significance of reuse of TWW
- Targets not changed, budget not increased, timeline remains same.

Working with refugees in MENA region

- Nearly 22.5million refugees around the world (out of 65.6 m forcibly displaced)
- MENA region hosts 26%...
 Turkey has 2.9m
- Conflict remains endemic in the MENA region
- Forced displacement endangers service provision, and social protection
- Access to scarce resources is a concern



Refugee crisis is not only humanitarian, but has economic, social, political and environmental impacts on places of origin and displacement.



Working with refugees in MENA region- Perceptions

- Refugees as;
- ✓ cheap agricultural labour (e.g. Lebanon)
- Competitors for scarce resource (e.g. sharing water in Jordan)
- Challengers in small businesses (e.g. street vendors in Yemen)
- Stressors on local infrastructure, already dilapidated (e.g. Iraq)
- Contributors to increase in cost of living

 particularly for the vulnerables
 amongst host communities



Working with refugees in MENA region- Perceptions Management

- ✓ Engage in inclusive, context & areabased planning
- ✓ Support improved service delivery
- ✓ Efforts to enhance skills and create opportunities (for youth)
- ✓ Create opportunities for socio-economic well-being, within the frame of the Host country laws – to ensure self reliance
- ✓ Improve dialogue between refugee elders and HC leaders / authorities
- ✓ Support for upgradation of civic infrastructure within host communities
- ✓ Advocacy with donors for supporting conjunctive work – refugees & HCs





Working with refugees in MENA region – Key Oxfam Interventions

- Provision of water-sanitation services and community engagement for hygiene promotion in the camps in Jordan, Lebanon, Syria and Iraq
- Installing water tanks, rebuilding toilets and educating children on hygiene awareness and supplies in schools in camps
- Emergency food security and vulnerable livelihoods support (Saharawi refugees – Algeria, SWM & Recycling - Zaatari)
- Building local skills and experience, so communities can be in control of their own lives




Case Study of Oxfam's work in Solid Waste Management- Zaatari, Jordan

Context / Concept/ Challenge

- **In Jordan** according to the World Bank, refugees constitute a third of the population (9.5 m in 2015).
- Annual Municipal Waste Generation est. 2.7 million tons (About 5% of this is generated by Syrian refugees)
- By 2034, expected to double.
- In Jordan, 48% of MSW is landfilled (19% in Egypt and 70% in Lebanon), 45% is openly dumped and 7% is recycled.





Case Study of Oxfam's work in Solid Waste Management - Zaatari, Jordan

Impact & Opporunities

- First project in Jordan 95% camp HH participate
- Reduction in material brought to landfill
- Opportunities for skill building and livelihood for refugees
- Clean surroundings!
- Need to collect 3 times more SW to reach break evenopportunities within HCs exist



Cardboards are bailed, Plastic is pulverised, Iron torn / shredded, Glass is broken & land-filled

Challenges

- Funding depends upon the phase, target group and the nature of interventions that the stakeholder wants to carry
- Partner's 'capacity' issues
- Track record of grants not available
- Effective MEAL system not in place at partner office

Local Partners are invaluable – bring in local knowledge & leadership
